Message from the Chair

Our website includes this arresting message:

"The board is now at a crossroads. All options have to be considered so that The Rural Communities Foundation of Nova Scotia can continue to be a partner in shaping the future face of rural Nova Scotia."

Just before last year's AGM we confronted the crossroads: the number of worthy funding applications was increasing to a point where our endowment fund was insufficient to meet the valid demand. We would not be able to continue despite our ten-year success in funding projects of rural community-based groups. This year, for example, there were 24 qualifying applications for our Leadership Grant, totalling nearly \$111,000. We awarded 5 totalling \$18,300. There are few alternatives where the remaining applicants can obtain financial support. Convinced that the Foundation's funding success is too vital to ignore, we chose to significantly strengthen our endowment fund.

The Board is putting together the necessary pieces to undertake a campaign for funds. One-time financial support

from the Province enabled the hiring of a Fund Development Coordinator for a one year term. She is working in cooperation with our very active committees toward a full-blown campaign, expected to be launched this fall.

The Foundation's day-to-day work continued in addition to the focus on fund development. Thanks to a Service Agreement with Literacy Nova Scotia, we are proud of our website, our social media initiatives, and of the timely management of a range of business commitments.

We are a "working board" in the sense of fulfilling roles that might otherwise be filled by paid staff.

Because our members live in the west, east, north, and south of the province most of our meetings are held through teleconference. This year three Board members attended the Georgetown Conference on rural revitalization in Atlantic Canada; one member attended the annual conference of the Community Foundation of Canada, in Winnipeg; two members pursued the question of the appropriate relationship of our Foundation with the Community Foundation of Nova Scotia; and, five members participated in a one-day workshop to develop a Business Plan for the Foundation.

By anyone's measuring stick the Board of Directors of the Rural Communities Foundation of Nova Scotia has performed at the highest level over the past year. We reluctantly say farewell and express the heartiest Thank You to three members who will not be renewing their terms. We have much to complete of the plans they helped to build, and we promise not to let them down.

2013 Rural Leadership Initiative Grant Recipients: 5 grants totaling \$18,300

Old School Community Gathering Place, Musquodoboit Harbour \$2250

This project will enhance the Old School's ability to support current and developing leaders with an online community resource centre and complementary workshops.

Chester Municipal Heritage Society, Chester \$5000 The Chester Heritage Society in partnership with St.

Stephen's Parish and Pink Dog Productions Inc. is working on a unique opportunity entitled "Musical Friends", to develop leadership skills for teens and young people in music, video production, skills implementation and community collaboration

Antigonish Women's Resource Centre and Sexual Assault Services, Strait Region \$5000

The Healthy Relationships for Youth Program (HRY) is a series of twelve sessions within the grade nine Health Curriculum that are delivered by trained youth facilitators. The interactive sessions are designed to reduce the risk of violence for youth by developing skills and knowledge about creating and maintaining healthy relationships.

Ecology Action Centre, Antigonish \$3760

This project will convene a small group of people in Antigonish to develop the leadership capacity to foster a local green economy. The project will revive the "kitchen table economics" study clubs of the Antigonish movement to learn about and act on local issues for the greater good.

Glace Bay Citizens Service League, Glace Bay \$2290

The grant will allow the re-establishment of the Asset Headquarters located at the Citizen's Service League. The asset headquarters will bring people of all ages together to create initiatives relevant to the people and other key stakeholders in Glace Bay.
